

TKE House Status Report

The Delta Nu Property Board has had an eventful 2019-20 academic year. We had enough actives live in the house to generate enough cash to begin paying the frater investors on their promissory notes used to pay off the mortgage. These fraters have been graciously waiting to be repaid of the remaining \$200,000+ in debt we have before we own the Teke House! The TKE Scholarship grants seem to really make a difference in encouraging undergrads to live in the house. For the 2020-21 school year, we have 15 signed housing contracts for the entire school year. This number is enough to cover all of our fixed and variable costs for the 20-21 school year...if we have classes on campus in the fall.

In terms of the house itself we had to do some repair work to the front area and were fortunate to have Frater Joe Sanders ΔN1559 to do some repair to the brickwork and front steps that had settled and needed attention. In the future, we would like to be able to sandblast the flagpole and have it repainted and have some concrete repair work done on the front drive and parking lot. These things would keep the front of the house looking nice but we are conserving our cash until we know more about the fall.

The Coronavirus issues that shuttered the campus and schools across the country caused us to provide a refund credit of \$650+ dollars to be applied to next fall's rent bill to those living in the house. To help conserve cash, almost all of the residents chose that option versus a cash refund. This will make next year's budget tight but manageable if the campus is open in August.

There are plans to have some activities during Homecoming this Fall which may include the TKE House, so look for future communication on those plans and we look forward to seeing everyone at that time to truly celebrate brotherhood in person!

We have more than 370 fraters that have supported Capital Improvements with donations totaling \$338,893 over the last 25 years and 187 fraters having a brick on the Teke for Life Wall. While that is a great accomplishment, only 80 fraters have donated in the last 10 years with fewer than 35 men donating more than \$2,000 to support Capital Improvements

The "TKE House Capital Improvement Fund" provides support only for "Capital Improvements" to the fraternity house. Contributions to the "TKE House Capital Improvement Fund" will be recognized on the "TKE House Capital Improvement Fund" will be recognized on the "The Richard W. Wiles ΔN 365 Teke for Life Alumni Donor Wall" in the form of bricks placed on the wall, commemorating Fraters' contribution to the future of Delta Nu's physical presence at Northwest Missouri State University.

Plans for this fund, once properly funded, include both short (1-3 yrs.) and long term (5-10 yrs.) permanent improvements to the house and grounds. The Board of Advisors is currently compiling a list of ideas, big and small to add to our house and improve its functionality, durability and overall fraternity experience for our members and alumni.

Funds will NOT be used for ongoing operating expenses, utilities, mortgage payments, etc. Per the Alumni Board, those expenses rest solely on the shoulders of the active chapter through collection of rent and parlor fees from the chapter members.

Memorial Funds and Bricks

Fraters can donate to Delta Nu memorial funs in the name of Fraters that have entered the Chapter Eternal. Once an individual Memorial Fund reaches \$500, a brick will be placed on the Memorial Teke for Life Alumni Wall in the chapter room of the TKE House. Funds donated to Memorial Funds go into Capital Improvements as well as Memorial Mulligans sold at the annual Delta Nu Memorial Scramble go towards Capital Improvements Funds too.

Capital Improvements Update







TKE Scholarship Fund

The TKE Delta Nu Active Members Scholarship is available to any collegiate member of TKE Delta Nu in good standing that meets the criteria for the scholarship program. This scholarships total S10,000 per school year, awarded to those Delta Nu Fraters meeting the criteria. The 2nd phase of this scholarship is to award scholarship money to incoming freshman males as a way to identify and recognize high potential new members for the fall semester.

We know higher performing students are both concerned about costs to join a Fraternity and very attracted to the possibility of scholarship money. This scholarship approach provides at least three benefits: 1) it provides motivation to potential new members if they join and meet the other conditions; 2) it helps in encouraging current members to live in the house for all years in school and 3) it differentiates between <u>very</u> high GPA's and high GPA's, which may enable us to recruit and maintain a higher chapter GPA. Attracting men committed to scholastic effort and to personal growth highlights our emphasis on education and leadership. Chapter GPA is the largest factor in the university's new assessment tool (known as the Greek Performance Scorecard, or "GPS") that ranks each Greek organization on its performance.

The next award will be given for the fall 2020 - 2021 academic year. The fund for the TKE Delta Nu Active Members Scholarship was established by Delta Nu in 1989 through the Northwest Foundation and is still the only scholarship fund from a Northwest fraternity.

The scholarship is awarded through contributions to the fund. Donations to this fund are tax deductible through the Northwest (Missouri State University) Foundation. As more contributions to the fund come in, increased amounts can be given in scholarship funding.

Alumni Profile – John Schroder



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Frater John Schroder, ΔN 382 is from Hebren, Nebraska, and graduated from Hebren High School. While attending NWMSC, Schroder originally set out to acquire a degree in Business, but ultimately found himself getting a B.S in Psychology and a Masters in Guidance and Counseling.

During his time at Northwest, Frater Schroder focused heavily on three things: Academics, Work, and TEKE. Arriving at Northwest, his dorm roommate, Frater Bruce Templer, initially pledged Tau Kappa Epsilon and the next semester he invited John to the house and to meet the guys ultimately inviting him to all their events. After an intense recruitment process, John Schroder officially became a part of Tau Kappa Epsilon in 1965.



While in TKE, Frater Schroder says that Bob Cotter and Bob Dickey were influencers at the time, not only to him, but the entire chapter John Schroder could also be credited with one of the Top TKE stories of the ages. During a "Pledge Dump", Schroder and company were given Ron Jones and Dwayne Hankins. The only rules were that you had to drop them off at least 10 miles from a TKE Chapter and be retrieved by fellow pledges, so why not drive them to the TKE Chapter at Oklahoma State University. Leaving at 10 PM with Jones and Hankins handcuffed together in the backseat, they arrived at the Oklahoma border. When stopping to take a picture with the Welcome to Oklahoma sign, Jones and Hankins still handcuffed escaped, and ran to a near by farm house. Jones and Hankins asked the owner to use their phone and a hacksaw to get the handcuffs off. The concerned homeowner called authorities and a warrant was issued for Schroder and company in the state of Oklahoma. This made National news!

Frater Schroder had an interesting exit from the college life. Before the ink could even dry on his diploma, he was 1 of 50,000 men that were being sent each month over to the war in Vietnam in 1966. He remembers the intensity and being bombarded every night at two in the morning and it ruining his beauty sleep. After returning from the ordeal, he went back to school and received his Masters in Guidance and Counseling in 1970-1971. Frater Schroder 's first job was in St. Joseph, Missouri where would stay for 30 years, the majority of the time at Central High School where he became Department Chairman.

While delivering pizza from Pagliai's one Saturday evening, Schroder met his soon to be wife, Carolyn, and they have been together for almost 53 years. He claims that the key to marriage is a tolerant wife and if you can find one, keep her! Being retired for almost 20 years, Frater Schroder has had some medical issues but despite those setbacks, he demonstrates love, charity, and esteem through his impeccable character.

Frater John feels the biggest thing that TKE gave to him was the sense of belonging. Coming from a small town, he didn't quite have that sense of community at the start of his time at Northwest. It was when he joined TKE that he felt not only a connection to the men in the chapter, but to the University too.

Alumni Profile – Arthur Jablonski



Frater Arthur Jablonski ΔN 604 is from Cicero, Illinois, and graduated from JS Morton High School. While attending NWMSC, Jablonski wasn't quite sure what to major in. He then decided to go down the Liberal Arts route, and take a Business minor with it. Jablonski would then go on to receive his B.S in Liberal Arts along with his minor in Business. During his time at Northwest, Frater Jablonski spent most of his time working in the Registrar's Office, while in the summers, a welding shop. One day, Jablonski saw a couple of gentlemen pulled over on the side of the road in a Volkswagen Beetle, and decided to pull over and help out. Little did he know, this would be the beginning of his Tau Kappa Epsilon journey.

After helping the group of guys with their broken down car, Jablonski was then invited to the TKE house multiple times by the group of guys. Once he began to bond with the guys, it would be in 1972 that Arthur Jablonski joined Tau Kappa Epsilon. He initiated into the Delta Nu Chapter of TKE on January 23, 1973 and graduated NWMSU 1975.

While in TKE, Frater Jablonski states that it was his pledge pop Mark Worth, and the Hegemon at the time Mark Harmon who really influenced him in his time at Tau Kappa Epsilon. Worth and Harmon just knew how to get you motivated and encouraged you in anything you did. He also remembers some of the great adventures that would occur during his time in Tau Kappa Epsilon. The pledge trip to Sioux City, Iowa was pretty memorable as nobody knew where they were going at first. The Fraters all pulled up to what they believed was finally the TKE house and all walked inside. Unfortunately, they stumbled upon a personal residence which was a little embarrassing. Frater Jablonski also enjoyed the pledge skip to Wathena, Kansas. At this time, you could drink at the age of 18 and everybody would basically go to Kansas to drink.

With that being said, the pledge skip to Wathena, Kansas, was a great time of brotherhood over tasty and LEGAL alcoholic beverages. During this time, Frater Jablonski remembers the Vietnam War as he was there during the end of student deferments. He remembers a student that lived next door who drew #1 and was gone in 6 weeks. Jablonski even remembers when the Student Radio Station would announce the draft number that you were given. At the time, numbers were given based upon your date of birth. After college, Frater Jablonski would go to work with a marketing company and then switch into banking. The next 40 years would involve Jablonski in the banking business working in the Financial Services Industry with Northern Trust Company managing many different operating areas and rising to Chief Operations Officer, Senior Vice President, and Director of Northern Private Limited LTD Asia Pacific. Art and his wife Karen of 40 years, lived in Bangalore India for 3 years building and running the business. In addition, he also served as President and Director of the Northern Trust Company of New York. Mr. Jablonski retired in 2017 as the Head of Internal Accounting Control.

Frater Jablonski says that the key to marriage is quite simple, and that is to give them what they want. He retired last year from the banking business and since then has purchased a bunch of farms over the years, and is now in the farming business post retirement and spends most of his time managing 280 acres of farmland 75 miles South of his home in Naperville Illinois.
