ADVISING WITH EXPERIENCE

An interview with Frater Russ Northup, DN 350

Being an advisor to a Greek chapter takes patience, knowledge, and a lot of practical experience. They must know what goes on with campus, the community, and the guys in the chapter. An advisor must also be an asset to the chapter in some way that will help to carry the chapter forward. One of Delta Nu's own, Russ Northup (DN 350), has joined Northwest's tennis coach Mark Rosewell, as an advisor to Tau Kappa Epsilon in Maryville.

Frater Northup was an active member of Delta Nu from 1964 to 1965. He transferred to Northwest from the University of Nebraska at Lincoln. He majored in mathematics, graduated and then joined the Navy where he entered the OCS program and was active for 12 years. In 1976, with his wife, he invested in a nursing home company, and now owns Tiffany Care Centers, headquartered in Mound City, Missouri, along with a couple other homes. In 1978, he became the general manager and co-owner of a Ford/Mercury dealership in Mound City until it closed in 1983.

In January 1989, Russ returned to Northwest to do graduate work for his MBA, which he received in August of 1990. Russ was offered a one

year teaching contract by the University. Having no prior plans to teach, he decided to take the position anyway. Since the Fall semester of 1990, Russ has been an instructor in the Marketing/Management department. He says that he enjoys the students and the work he is doing.

Approached in the Spring of 1992 by the chapter to be an advisor, Northup responded, "I don't think you want me, I'm conservative. The time I pledged makes me the wrong person for the job." The idea, however reluctant he was, still sounded fascinating, and Frater Northup felt that he could help to make some changes for the better for TKE. "TKE was something I cherished, and still do. I was looking for the opportunity to get involved with TKE again, but if my name was going to be associated, I want to be proud of it."

To Frater Northup, TKE was a place where young men could learn new skills and build their characters and values. With campus, however, TKE had an image to uphold, regardless of what young men were trying to learn. "The reputation of Tekes and greeks need to improve without jeopardizing the autonomy they all enjoy." Especially from his position as an instructor at Northwest,

events of the chapter, good and bad, come back to him, not only because he is an adviser, but because he is an alumni.

Since accepting the position of chapter adviser, Frater Northup has been hard at work with a number of projects for Delta Nu. The first of these projects was to start setting up a new Board of Control. Close to completion, the Board will advise the chapter on investments and on the steps that need to be taken to ensure the building of a new home for Delta Nu. "A new house, that'll never happen!" some alumni have screamed. Russ has replied to that saying by commenting on the poor condition of the current house and the need to have the majority of the chapter living in it, not just officers. "Getting a new house was something we worked on in the 60s, so it is still a priority."

We have been patching holes here and there, painting over cracks, and repairing the things we can fix, but this can't last forever. Our realization has been that we won't see the foundation for a new house in

two to three years. With this in mind, we need to keep patching and working to keep the house standing until the time comes when we can build.

To give you an idea of what has gone into the house this semester alone in "patch-up" repairs, we've prepared a run down of our expenses for you. The new house manager for 1993 is **Travis Galloway**, and you can send questions, comments or donations to him.

Roof(3rd,2nd floor) patching = \$600.00
Property Taxes = \$525.00
Broken pipes in basement plus other plumbers fees = \$200.00
Broken Windows = \$250.00
New lock for front door(old one is irreparable) = \$450.00
Misc. supplies = \$50.00/month
New ceiling in basement = \$325.00
Bills = \$3545.00
TOTAL = \$6190.00
